
Vision envisages a Society where people live in Unity and Diversity Based on the Gospel Values of Justice and Love.



# Community Ushered Regional Effort In Health Care in North East

# SDG 3 - Good Health and Well being

The Health project 'Community Ushered Regional Effort in Health Care (CURE) North East India' envisages Promotion of safe motherhood and child health and enhanced community competency towards malaria management in 254 remote villages in Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram in North East India through participatory and people led preventive and curative health care measures.

Project reaches out to 7 Diocesan Social Service Societies, 6 dioceses, 15 districts, and 31 health and 254 villages. The target groups are pregnant women, mothers, children, adolescent girls and the people in general for malaria management from 254 villages.



#### **Annual Report 2018-2019**



Promotion of safe motherhood and child health and enhanced community competency towards malaria management in 254 remote villages in Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram in North East India through participatory and people led preventive and curative health care measures.





#### **Specific Objectives**

- 1. To increase the rate of institutional delivery by 40% and the number fully immunized children up to the age 2 years by 30% in 254 villages by the end of project period.
- 2. To reduce the occurrence of Malaria by 30% in the project operational villages through preventive and curative measures in 254 project villages by the end of project period.
- 3. To make the Health Facilitation Centers (HFC) functional with great relevance in order to reach their service to at least 60% of the population by the end of project period.

#### Service leads to honour

Justina Timungpi is a village health worker of Motha village having 80 families over a population of 384. She is also the ASHA of PHC Jrikyndeng and is assigned to work for 1000 population. She rendered her selflessly service for the pregnant mothers, children and other patients. She visits the village regularly and on mother and child health, malaria, and gives health education on diet. She advice them to go for regular check up and also accompanies patient to hospitals for the deliveries. She was awarded for her hard work, compassion and untiring spirit by block PHC with trophy and certificate of Appreciation last year. She was again honored by the Hon. Chief Minister of Assam on the occasion of 67th Foundation Day of the Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council (KAAC) on 23rd June 2018. She was given a scooty for her best performance in the health sector for the year 2016 to 2018.



# **Motivation leads to Transformation** in Health and Hygiene

The name of the village is Madan which is a very remote village in Karbi Angel district of Assam having the population of 343 with 60 households. They belong to different religion following very rigid religious practices whether they are Christian or Hindus. The health worker who was in charge of this village had very difficult time to convince them on the importance of having a toilet nearby their home since they were following open air defecation. The villagers had only 5 toilets in their village 2015. The health worker Miss Gracery Sten motivated the village community to build a toilet adjacent to their houses. Her constant motivation, education on health care brought about a real transformation. They realized the importance of maintaining hygiene, good health. This changed the mindset of the villagers for having a toilet at home. Each family made a toilet nearby their house by their own effort and manual work.

- In Manipur, network with TCLF (Tribal Churches Leaders Forum), AMCO (All Manipur Christian Organization) and AMCU (All Manipur Catholic Organization), Love Manipur, Widow's welfare Association and Nazarene Ministry exists
- MOU have been signed yearly with 66 school authorities across the project areas for implementing peace activities
- Confidence and motivational level of 4126 SHG women increased as a result of different training programmes to resolve conflicting situations.
- Women Peace Club members empowered to resist and respond to social evils (Alcoholism, Gambling etc.)
- Increased participation in Public demonstrations and campaigns against social evils (The members of SHGs, Rani Gaidinlu and Thuicham Resource centers of DSSS along with Rongmei Lu Phuam (RLP), participated in a rally from Imphal to Jiribam with public meeting and rally at Noney and Jiribam)

- Basic health facilities are assessed by the community
- Two doctors from the block health centre and one pharmacist and two nurses extended their services for the health camp







